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SCAFFOLDING OF ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNERS (ELL) CURRICULUM WITHIN NEWYORK STATE (NYS'S) CURRICULUM

The New York State Education Department ("NYSED") is seeking proposals for applicants with English Language Learner curriculum and instruction expertise to provide feedback on ELA and math curriculum vendor draft scaffolds, guide the development of these vendor scaffolds through creating sample prototypes, and conduct in person sessions with curriculum vendors/developers on research and best practice for scaffolding instruction for ELLs. The purpose is to ensure that the ELL scaffolds in NYS's curriculum are uniform across P-12 in ELA and Math curriculum modules, and is based on research and best practice.

The eligible applicants are: Local Education Agencies ("LEAs"); Boards of Cooperative Educational Services ("BOCES"); public or private Institutions of Higher Education ("IHEs"); systems of public IHE's, so long as the particular institutions participating in the project, and the services each institution will provide, are identified in the proposal; not-for-profit and for-profit organizations, companies or agencies. Current NYSED P-12 ELA and Math curriculum development vendors are not eligible applicants. For the purposes of this RFP, an LEA is defined as a school district or a charter school.

NYSED will award one (1) contract with a term of approximately 12 months, beginning on May 17, 2013 and ending on May 16, 2014.

1 DESCRIPTION OF ELL SCAFFOLD AND SERVICES TO BE PERFORMED

Work Statement and Specifications

This section of the bid package details the services and products to be acquired. Please note that the contract process also includes general New York State administrative terms and conditions, as well as terms and conditions required by New York State law. These terms and conditions address issues related to both the submission of bids and any subsequent contract; they are included separately in this bid package for your information. Please review all terms and conditions.

1.1 Overview of the NYS Curriculum and ELL Scaffolds

1.1.1 Summary

NYSED is currently developing curriculum modules aligned to the New York State P-12 Common Core Learning Standards, which for English Language Arts ("ELA") & Literacy and Mathematics include the Common Core State Standards. Taken together, these standards are known as the New York State P-12 Common Core Learning Standards for English Language Arts & Literacy ("NYS P-12 CCLS for ELA & Literacy") and the New York State P-12 Common Core Learning Standards for Mathematics ("NYS P-12 CCLS for Mathematics"). These modules will support teaching and learning in Grades P-12 classrooms across New York State and provide access to sequenced, spiraled, content-rich statewide curriculum programming and instructional practices that support the attainment of the New York State P-12 Common Core Learning Standards and align to the Board of Regents' strategic goals. The modules will also include scaffolding for English Language Learners (ELLs), among other student populations, in order to ensure they have access to the ELA and Math curriculum. The primary purpose of this RFP is to assist the ELA and math curriculum module vendors with this ELL scaffolding work.

1.1.2 Definition of Scaffolding and Supports for ELLs.

Scaffolding is help that is "just right" and "just in time," provided to learners so that, with the scaffold support in place, the learners can accomplish tasks they would not be able to complete alone. In addition, scaffolds allow learners to develop the knowledge, skills, or language required to support their own performance in the future. In terms of educational materials, scaffolded lessons need to be generative, that is, they should promote student autonomy over time. An important feature of pedagogical scaffolding is that it should provide students with the opportunity to engage in a novel application of ideas.

The term scaffolding comes from the work of Jerome Bruner, who defined it as:

A process of 'setting up' the situation to make the child's entry easy and successful and then gradually pulling back and handing the role to the child as he becomes skilled enough to manage it (1983:60). Bruner, J. (1983). *Child's Talk: Learning to Use Language*. New York: Norton.

Flexible supports may include the following (and other) successful modes:

- Excellent text dependent questions in a thoughtful sequence;
- Effectively spiraling levels of text complexity:
- Digestible chunks of knowledge or information sequenced from an accessible base to the more complex;
- Building student knowledge through reading and writing;
- Strategic selection of pivotal vocabulary and allusions;
- Making connections between different portions of a text;
- Related texts or problems at an appropriate grade level;
- Guidance regarding less "frustrating" access points for struggling learners.

ELLs need additional support so that content is comprehensible to them in English. Additional support techniques should include: explicit instruction of strategically selected vocabulary (focus on high frequency Tier II and III words); building background knowledge; strategic and purposeful use of multiple media (e.g. strategic use of short video clips, carefully selected images, and purposeful use of manipulatives, directly related to the text or content being taught); instruction in word-learning strategies and comprehension strategies; and building on and supporting students' first language knowledge. Scaffolds for ELLs must be developmentally appropriate and include entry points and supports for ELLs at all levels of English language proficiency.

1.1.3 Mandatory Requirements

Eligible applicants must agree to the Mandatory Requirements found below and must submit the Mandatory Requirements Certification Form located in "Submission Documents" signed by an authorized person.

Mandatory Bid Requirements

1. For those activities that will be subcontracted, the proposed subcontractors' names, M/WBE status, specific services, and costs must be specifically indicated on the Subcontracting Form located in the "Submission Documents" section of this RFP. NYSED reserves the right to approve all subcontractors. Subcontracting is defined as, "Non-employee direct personal services and related incidental expenses, including travel." Subcontracting will be limited to thirty percent (30%) of the contract budget. If subcontractors should change during the contract term, NYSED must be

- notified immediately and reserves the right to reject any new subcontractor the vendor considers. The Subcontracting Form must be updated annually and submitted to NYSED.
- 2. The applicant must include with the submission of the technical proposal, at least three current professional references to substantiate qualifications. Current shall mean references for whom the vendor has performed work within the last three years. NYSED staff cannot be used as references.
- 3. The applicant must provide resume(s) that show that key staff have developed scaffolding and techniques that have been proven to have a statistically significant impact on ELLs, which must be substantiated by research conducted within the last 5 years. Resumes must explicitly include references to the research.
- 4. All applicants must sign and return the Mandatory Requirements Certification located in Section 5.10 of this RFP. By signing the Mandatory Requirements Certification, the applicant certifies that they agree to provide and/or meet all of the Mandatory Requirements listed. Proposals that do not include the signed Mandatory Requirements Certification will be disqualified and removed from further consideration.

Mandatory Contract Requirements

In order to use the benefits of this funded program for future educational purposes, NYSED shall own all materials developed or created during provision of contract services by the contractor, including but not limited to: methodologies, measures, software, code, documentation, white papers, implementation guidance, training materials, evaluation forms, data compilations, and reports developed pursuant to the agreements resulting from this RFP. Materials developed for NYSED must not be dependent upon the acquisition of a license to any third-party-owned software or materials unless the vendor secures a perpetual, non-exclusive royalty-free license for: (a) NYSED, local school district or BOCES personnel, and/or contracted personnel by such parties, to use, distribute materials for the purpose of conducting district evaluations; and (b) NYSED to use, or sublicense to contractor to use, for purpose of creation of derivatives of the deliverables (but not the licensed software or materials) for NYSED educational purposes. Materials prepared under this contract shall be in a form that will be ready for copyright in the name of NYSED. Should the vendor use the services of consultants or other organizations or individuals who are not regular employees of the vendor, the subcontract agreement shall provide that such works produced by such other consultants, organizations or individuals and developed or used for purposes of the agreement shall be the sole and exclusive property of NYSED.

- 2. The vendor shall reproduce, use, display, and include copies of NYSED's trademarks, trade name, logos, copyrights, and other intellectual property (collectively, the "Marks") on all copies of materials produced for NYSED. The vendor acknowledges that the Marks are owned solely and exclusively by NYSED, and nothing contained in the resulting contract shall give the vendor any ownership right or interest in such Marks or a right to use the Marks except pursuant to this contract.
- 3. All vendors must adhere to NYSED's security protocols regarding the transmission of secure materials via encrypted files and the secure shipment of all materials using a carrier that has ground tracking capability. Electronic transfer via e-mail, Internet, or facsimile (FAX) of any vendor generated products is not permitted unless authorized by NYSED to do so on a case-by-case basis.
- 4. All materials are to be held strictly confidential and must not be copied, duplicated, or disseminated in any manner or discussed with anyone other than persons authorized by NYSED.
- 5. All invoices submitted for payment must include dates of services and an itemized list of activities and costs consistent with the approved Schedule of Deliverables contained in the executed contract. Payment(s) for subcontractor(s) must list the subcontractor's name(s), payment amount(s), and nature of services provided separately on the invoice submitted. Invoices with incomplete information will be returned to the vendor.
- 6. The vendor agrees to cooperate with, and when there is a difference of opinion, defer to NYSED, on the continual review and refinement of applicant products to ensure that all materials are uniform and coherent across all four vendors.

1.1.4 Minority and Women-Owned Business Enterprise (M/WBE) Compliance Requirements

MINORITY AND WOMEN-OWNED BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (M/WBE) PARTICIPATION GOALS

Article 15-A identifies the State's procurement goals for Minority Business Enterprise (MBE) and Women-Owned Business Enterprise (WBE) participation as 12% and 8%, respectively, of the total contract budget or as specifically outlined in the RFP. NYSED's intent is to comply with Article 15-A and all bidders must demonstrate a good faith effort to comply with these goals. Minority and Women-Owned

Business Enterprise (M/WBE) participation includes any and all services, materials or supplies purchased from New York State certified minority and women owned firms. Utilization of certified Minority and Women-Owned firms will be applied toward the goals. Bidders can achieve compliance with NYSED's Minority and Women-Owned Business Enterprise goals as described below.

ACHIEVE FULL COMPLIANCE WITH DESIGNATED GOALS (preferred)

Bidders should submit subcontracting forms that meet or exceed NYSED's participation goals for this procurement. Bidders must complete and submit M/WBE 100: Utilization Plan, M/WBE 102: Notice of Intent to Participate and EEO 100: Staffing Plan. Instructions and copies of these forms are located in the Submission Documents. All firms utilized must be certified with the NYS Division of Minority and Women Business Development before beginning any work on this contract. The contact person on M/WBE matters is available throughout the application and procurement process to assist bidders in meeting the M/WBE goals. NYSED reserves the right to approve the addition or deletion of subcontractors or suppliers to enable bidders to comply with the M/WBE goals, provided such addition or deletion does not impact the technical proposal and/or increase costs.

DOCUMENTATION OF GOOD FAITH EFFORTS

Bidders must undertake a good faith effort to solicit NYS Certified M/WBE firms as subcontractors and/or suppliers in fulfillment of this procurement. Means of solicitation may include but are not limited to: advertisements in minority centered publications; solicitation of vendors found in the NYS Directory of Certified Minority and Women-Business **Enterprises** (http://www.esd.ny.gov/MWBE/directorySearch.html); and the solicitation of minority and women-oriented trade and labor organizations. Bidders will be required to certify and attest to their good faith efforts by completing NYSED's Certification of Good Faith Efforts (Forms M/WBE 105 and M/WBE 105A). See theM/WBE Submission Documents for detailed examples of and required forms to document good faith efforts.

NYSED reserves the right to reject any bid for failure to document "good faith efforts" to comply with the stated M/WBE goals.

In the event Bidders cannot comply with NYSED's designated participation goals, said bidders must document their "good faith efforts" to comply and submit one of the following requests.

REQUEST A PARTIAL WAIVER OF DESIGNATED GOALS

In order to request a partial waiver of the designated goals for this procurement, Bidders must provide documentation of their good faith efforts to obtain the use of certified M/WBE enterprises along with their bid proposal forms. The subcontracting forms must include the participation percentage(s) for which they seek approval. Bidders will be required to certify and attest to their good faith efforts. Bidders should submit a request for a partial waiver (Form M/WBE 101) and document their Good Faith Efforts (Forms M/WBE 105 and M/WBE 105A) at the same time as the bid is submitted. Bidders must also complete and submit M/WBE 100: Utilization Plan, M/WBE 102: Notice of Intent to Participate and EEO 100: Staffing Plan. The M/WBE coordinator is available throughout the procurement process to assist in all areas of M/WBE compliance.

REQUEST A COMPLETE WAIVER OF DESIGNATED GOALS

In order to request a complete waiver of the designated goals for this procurement, Bidders must provide documentation of their Good Faith Efforts to obtain the use of certified M/WBE enterprises along with their bid proposal forms. Bidders will be required to certify and attest to their good faith efforts. Bidders should submit a request for a complete waiver on Form M/WBE 101 and document their Good Faith Efforts (Forms M/WBE 105 and M/WBE 105A) at the same time as they submit their bid. The M/WBE coordinator is available throughout the procurement process to assist in all areas of M/WBE compliance.

All payments to Minority and Women-Owned Business Enterprise subcontractor(s) must be reported to NYSED M/WBE Program Unit using M/WBE 103 Quarterly M/WBE Compliance Report. This report must be submitted on a quarterly basis and can be found at www.oms.nysed.gov/fiscal/MWBE/forms.html.

1.2 Overview

As part of the New York State Race to the Top (RTTT) initiative, NYS is developing and implementing curriculum modules (ELA & Literacy P-12 and Mathematics P-12). The primary purpose of these modules is to support systemic change in teaching and learning of standards-based curricula statewide by focusing on five key components - curriculum, instruction, assessment, professional development, and leadership - simultaneously across grade levels. Through newly developed and innovative curriculum modules, based on research, and through statewide professional development to implement curriculum modules, New York State is positioned to better

prepare its students to pursue pathways to colleges and careers in a globally competitive economy. For more information see http://usny.nysed.gov/rttt/rfp/sa-06/nysed_rfp_sa-06.pdf (Section 1.3.1) and http://usny.nysed.gov/rttt/rfp-archive/sa-03/nysed_rfp_sa-03a.pdf (Section 1.3.1).

As part of this initiative, it is critical that ELLs have access to this curriculum and that teachers have guidance on how to provide appropriate instruction to ELLs; thus providing ELLs with equal access to rigorous grade level curriculum.

The NYS curriculum modules in ELA & Literacy P-12 and Mathematics P-12 are currently being developed by four different vendors: Core Knowledge (P-2 ELA), Expeditionary Learning (3-5 ELA), Public Consulting Group, Inc (6-12 ELA), Common Core Inc. (P-12 Math). These modules will include:

For ELA & Literacy and Mathematics:

- o curriculum maps with learning progressions
- o unit overviews
- o performance tasks
- lesson strategy documents that outline teacher and student actions/outcomes
- appropriate learning scaffolds (outlined for ELLs and students with disabilities, but not limited to these student sub-group populations)
- For ELA & Literacy only:
 - sample texts of grade level complexity
 - o rigorous text-dependent questions to guide conversations and writing
 - research tasks
 - approach to word study is research-based
 - incorporates research based approaches for connecting quantity of reading to increased background knowledge and vocabulary
- For Mathematics only:
 - o extensive problem sets
 - balance of tasks and activities
 - balance in how time is spent
 - o common sense in achieving balance

A major focus of the Common Core is on twelve Instructional Shifts needed for their effective implementation in ELA & Literacy and in Mathematics. For more information on these "Common Core shifts," see:

1.2.1 Deliverables

The applicant must work with NYSED staff to provide deliverables in accordance with NYSED's review process and timeline described below.

- 1. Review curriculum modules (or materials as is the case for P-2 ELA) and provide feedback to vendors to ensure high quality scaffolds for ELLs are embedded throughout. Curriculum modules are being developed in P-12 ELA and Math by four different vendors. The work to be completed includes: five (5) components for P-2 ELA (see http://engageny.org/sites/default/files/resource/attachments/overview-of-the-core-knowledge-language-arts-program.pdf for numbers of units within each component); six (6) curriculum modules per grade in grades 3-12 ELA; and no fewer than five and no more than seven (5-7) modules in grades P-12 math. See Section 6 definitions for an explanation of modules components.
 - a. The contractor is expected to review existing modules and those in draft form of the four curriculum vendors and provide recommendations to the Department on the overall structure and format of the scaffolds within their modules. (Completed and/or drafted curriculum modules per grade and content area vary; see draft curricular maps for detailed information on the sequence of curriculum module and development http://engageny.org/resource/year-long-draft-curricular-maps-in-ela-andmathematics/). Note: these curricular maps may change slightly; however, this link is provided to give a sense of the scope and sequence. The documents provided by the contractor to the Department will identify strengths and weaknesses of each vendor based on the available material and make recommendations to create uniformity and coherence across the four vendors. Each document must be no more than ten (10) pages and no less the two (2) pages in length. The documents must include scaffolding and instructional techniques for ELLs that are based on current research-based studies. The research-based studies must be cited with a description of their statistically significant impact on teacher practices and ELL student outcomes and must have been conducted in the last five (5) addition. the scaffolding and instructional techniques years. recommended must include an explanation for how the scaffolds described are aligned to the Common Core. The documents must also and at a minimum answer the following questions:
 - i. Are there additional scaffolding techniques that should be integrated into the vendor's curriculum materials? (E.g. Scaffolds provide visual and audio aids but generally do not include scaffolds and techniques to build academic language for ELLs).
 - ii. Are there any scaffolding techniques in the existing materials that are not research based and not appropriate to develop language and content for ELLs? (E.g. Some scaffolds include strategies to teach academic vocabulary, but do so without contextual supports, which research shows [include citations] is not an effective strategy to build academic vocabulary for ELLs).

- iii. Are there any scaffolding techniques that are not fully developed, or not sufficiently described in the curriculum materials? (E.g. some scaffolds and strategies suggest the use and support of home language or bilingual materials, but do not sufficiently demonstrate how teachers can integrate these practices into their lessons.)
- iv. Are there any examples of scaffolding techniques used in the curriculum materials that are very strong that should be highlighted or recommended for other vendors? (E.g. Vendor X has integrated word learning strategies and mini-lessons that build vocabulary that ELLs may struggle within the lesson, for example Unit , page).
- v. Are there any techniques or strategies that are not-ELLs specific, but will work well to scaffold instruction for ELLs that should be highlighted for teachers of ELLs? (E.g. Vendor X has included leveled questions in the lessons and units, for example Unit _, page _, that provide entry points to engage with the text for ELLS so that they can build towards answering questions that require high order thinking skills).
- vi. Are there sufficient examples of scaffolding techniques referenced in the curriculum materials? (E.g. The vendor has provided a few examples of how to use graphic organizers to scaffold instruction for ELLS, but in many places there are references to the use of graphic organizers in general without specific guidance to teachers on what types of graphic organizers are appropriate for the specific lesson and examples of such graphic organizers and how to properly use them with ELLs).
- vii. Does the vendor's placement and format of scaffolds sufficiently indicate to teachers how to employ the techniques? (E.g. References to scaffolds must be integrated into the main lesson rather than in separate appendices, curriculum or other formatting to indicate that they are part of the main lesson.)

These four (4) overall documents will be due within one month of the contract start.

b. In addition to the four overall documents, the applicant will annotate each set of curricular materials with notes and recommendations on the quality of existing scaffolds and identify where additional scaffolds are needed in each module. Annotations should answer, but not be limited to answering, the following guiding questions:

- i. Do the proposed ELL scaffolds target the language and content support that ELLs will need to access the grade level content?
- ii. Are there additional scaffolding techniques that should be integrated into the vendor's curriculum materials? (Note: any additional scaffolding suggested must meet acceptance criteria outlined in "Acceptance Criteria for Prototypes")
- iii. Are there any scaffolding techniques in the existing materials that are not research based and not appropriate to develop language and content for ELLs?
- iv. Are there any scaffolding techniques that are not fully developed, or not sufficiently described in the curriculum materials?
- v. Are there sufficient examples of scaffolding techniques referenced in the curriculum materials?
- vi. Are there any techniques or strategies generally employed in the curriculum materials that could be challenging for ELLs? If so, are there recommendations for changes to the general instructional strategies or additional scaffolds for ELLs in order to ensure they can access those general instructional approaches?
- vii. Are there any scaffolding techniques that are particularly strong in the curriculum materials that should be further used or employed by other vendors?
- viii. Is there language in the curriculum materials that is not essential to the lesson or not in the text that could prove challenging to ELLs (e.g. passive voice)? If so, are there recommendations for changes to language or additional scaffolds ELLs may need in order to understand the instructional materials?

Any new scaffolding strategies or techniques proposed in this deliverable must be based on current research-based studies. The research-based studies must be cited with a description of their statistically significant impact on teacher practices and ELL student outcomes and must have been conducted in the last five (5) years. In addition, the scaffolding and instructional techniques recommended must include an explanation for how the scaffolds described are aligned to the Common Core.

This deliverable in total will result in annotating five (5) components for P-2 ELA (specific information for each component may be found at http://engageny.org/sites/default/files/resource/attachments/overview of the core knowledge language arts program.pdf); six (6) curriculum modules per grade in grades 3-12 ELA; and no fewer than five and no

more than seven (5-7) modules in grades P-12 math as described in the Glossary, section six (6) of this RFP. For budgeting purposes, applicant should assume that five (5) components are required for P-2 ELA, 6 modules are required per grade for 3-12 ELA (60 in total), and 7 modules are required per grade for P-12 Math (98 in total).

2. Create sample prototypes of effective lessons within curricular modules/materials (including formative assessments) for ELLs. .

Prototypes are expected to consolidate the most effective parts of the curriculum materials produced by the four vendors and provide embedded scaffolding techniques that are research based and grade-appropriate. The prototypes are expected to guide the curriculum vendors' adjustment/development of new scaffolds. The length of each prototype will vary based on the content area and length and type of lesson.

Contractor will review an existing lesson chosen by NYSED which will contain the following four areas. Each prototype will explicitly describe scaffolding techniques for teachers of ELLs within each of the four areas:

- 1. Content and Pedagogy
- 2. Design and Format
- 3. Data Driven Instruction and Assessment
- 4. Embedded Professional Development

Each prototype must:

- Be aligned to the NYS P-12 Common Core Learning Standards.

- Be aligned to a specific set of curriculum materials developed by the relevant vendor for that grade band/content area. E.g., the prototype must demonstrate scaffolding techniques for a specific unit or lesson in a vendor's existing curriculum materials.
- o Be aligned to research-based strategies that develop language and content learning for English Language Learners. The research-based strategies must be cited with a description of their statistically significant impact on teacher practices and ELL student outcomes and must have been conducted in the last five (5) years. In addition, the scaffolding and instructional techniques used must include an explanation for how the scaffolds described are aligned to the Common Core.
- Incorporate research-based strategies that draw on student's home language skills, build background knowledge, and develop language related to the grade level content and text.

If new or additional texts are proposed in the prototype (i.e. texts not included in vendor's original curriculum materials to, for example, build background knowledge), must employ three dimensions of text complexity in selecting any proposed additional text for prototype:

- 1. Use quantitative measures to assign a text to a grade band.
- 2. Use qualitative measures to locate a text within a specific grade band.
- 3. Use professional judgment to decide how suited a text is for a specific instructional purpose with a particular set of students (http://www.achievethecore.org/steal-these-tools/text-

complexity/quantitative-measures;

complexity/qualitative-measures)

A total of 10 prototypes will be developed, as described in the table below, for the following grade bands in ELA: P-2, 3-5, 6-8 and 9-12, as well as the following grade bands in Math: P-5, 6-8 and 9-12. The applicant will consult with NYSED to select the specific grade in each band on which to focus.

- 3. Conduct meetings with curriculum developers regarding ELL scaffolds. At the direction of the Department, the applicant will develop agendas and materials to work with curriculum vendors to ensure high quality scaffolds for ELLs. Based on a review of the draft curriculum modules, the applicant will identify key areas and types of scaffolds for ELLs that are needed. The applicant will work with NYSED to conduct a total of three (3) in person meetings with curriculum vendors regarding ELL scaffolds. Meetings will be held in Albany or New York City, as determined by NYSED. For budgeting purposes assume each meeting will be one full day in duration. The applicant will participate in calls organized by NYSED once per month to provide oral guidance to their written feedback on curriculum and curriculum modules.
- Review and provide feedback on professional development materials. Each
 curriculum vendor will provide a professional development plan for including ELL
 scaffolds in their curriculum materials. The contractor will review the professional
 development plans for ELL scaffolds and provide to the Department a document
 identifying strengths and weaknesses of each vendor and make
 recommendations to create uniformity and coherence across the four vendors.
 The four documents (one for each vendor) must be no more than 10 pages and
 no less than 2 pages each and must at a minimum answer the following
 questions:
 - a. Does the vendor have a clear plan to train teachers on ELL scaffolds and strategies?
 - b. Does the vendor allocate sufficient time to train teachers on ELL scaffolds?
 - c. Does the vendor's scope and sequence integrate training on ELL scaffolds?
 - d. Does the vendor clearly articulate the types of ELL scaffold they intend to train teachers on?

- e. If specific scaffolding strategies are articulated in the vendor's scope and sequence, are they research based scaffolding strategies?
- f. Is the vendor's approach to professional development on ELL scaffolds aligned with research and best practice for training teachers of ELLs?
- g. Are there any specific scaffolds not mentioned that (based on their content and grade bands) should be included in the training?
- h. Are there any specific scaffolds proposed by the vendor that are not appropriate?
- i. Based on the professional development plan, is there a need for additional training or support for teachers on how to implement ELL scaffolds?
- 4. Attend meetings with NYSED staff regarding development of scaffolds across curriculum: The vendor will work with NYSED staff to coordinate the development of scaffolds for ELLs across all ELA and Math curriculum. A maximum of four in-person meetings with NYSED staff will be held in Albany or New York City, as determined by NYSED, and additional meetings will take place via conference call for the duration of the contract. For budgeting purposes assume the face-to-face meetings will each be one full day in duration.
- 5. Facilitate meetings with NYS ESL and Bilingual teachers. The applicant will conduct two full day meetings with 20-30 representative ESL and bilingual teachers, convened by NYSED in Albany or New York City. The applicant will be responsible for developing the agenda and providing materials. The purpose of the first meeting will be to work with the select teachers to gather input on draft curriculum that will inform the development of prototypes. The purpose of the second meeting will be to work with the same teachers to review draft prototypes and curriculum developed with their input.
- 6. Create P-12 ELA and Math resource guides for teachers on ELL scaffolds. The vendor will create a resource guide for ELA teachers and a resource guide for Math teachers, on how to provide high quality scaffolds for ELLs in their The resource guide will incorporate the prototypes developed, classrooms. examples from finalized curriculum modules, and will annotate such examples for teachers. The resource guides will identify key scaffolding techniques for ELLs based on research and best practice, and serve as a guide for ELA and Math content area teachers for how to effectively implement those techniques in their classrooms. All scaffolding and instructional techniques for ELLs included in the resource guides must be based on current research-based studies. research-based studies must be cited with a description of their statistically significant impact on teacher practices and ELL student outcomes and must have been conducted in the last five (5) years. In addition, the scaffolding and instructional techniques recommended must include an explanation for how the scaffolds described are aligned to the Common Core. Both resource guides, provided in Microsoft Word format, will be approved by NYSED and posted on the NYSED website.

The applicant will work collaboratively with designated NYSED staff to:

- 1) Provide all written materials to NYSED in Microsoft Word format.
- Ensure that the work is in alignment with the work plan included in the original proposal, and that the work plan is consistent with implementation timeline as described.
- 3) Communicate regularly with NYSED and partners on the progress of program development and implementation via various modes including but not limited to: e-mail correspondence and schedule meetings as described below.

1.2.2 Deliverable Review Process and Timeline

For all written deliverables, NYSED intends to adhere to the following process and vendor contractual work plans should incorporate this process for each deliverable:

Payment Schedule

Payments will be made upon the completion and NYSED acceptance of each deliverable unit and in accordance with the per unit deliverable costs included in the bid form cost proposal.

1.3 Subcontracting Limit

Subcontracting will be limited to thirty percent (30%) of the contract budget. Subcontracting is defined as non-employee direct personal services and related incidental expenses, including travel.

If the vendor proposes to change subcontractors during the contract period, NYSED must be notified prior to the change. NYSED reserves the right to reject any replacement subcontractors proposed by the vendor and reserves the right to approve all changes in subcontractors. The Subcontracting Form located in the Submission Documents must be updated annually and submitted to NYSED. Using this form, the vendor must also report to NYSED, on an annual basis, actual expenditures incurred for all subcontractors and indicate which subcontracting costs are associated with M/WBE.

Consultant Staff Changes

The Contractor will maintain continuity of the Consultant Team staff throughout the course of the contract. All changes in staff will be subject to NYSED approval. The replacement Consultant(s) with comparable skills will be provided at the same or lower hourly rate.

1.4 Contract Period

NYSED will award one (1) contract with a term of approximately 12 months to begin in May 2013 and ending May 14, 2014

At the end of any contract term otherwise provided for herein, if a replacement contract has not yet been approved in accordance with State law, any contract awarded hereunder may be extended unilaterally by the State, upon notice to the contractor, at the same terms and conditions, including all contract pricing, for a period of one month. Additionally, this extension may be for a period of up to three months with the concurrence of the contractor. However, any extension will terminate immediately upon approval of the replacement contract, except where a period for transition of contractors has been previously provided for.

1.5 Electronic Processing of Payments

1.6 M/WBE and Equal Employment Opportunities Requirements

3 EVALUATION CRITERIA AND METHOD OF AWARD

This section begins with the criteria the agency will use to evaluate bids, and closes with the "method of award," or how the contractor will be selected. This will be followed by various terms and conditions that reflect the specific needs of this project, as well as New York State contract guidelines and requirements.

3.1 Criteria for Evaluating Bids

All complete proposals received by the deadline will be reviewed using the following criteria and ratings. Applicants must ensure that all components of this application request have been addressed, the required number of copies has been provided, all forms and assurances have been completed, and the original signatures are included as required.

A proposal will first be reviewed by NYSED staff to ensure that the proposal is complete, and that all of the mandatory requirements have been addressed.

An evaluation committee will complete a review of the Technical Proposals for all responsive proposals submitted. The committee will review each Technical Proposal to determine compliance with the requirements described in the RFP. The committee retains the right to determine whether any deviation from the requirements of this RFP is substantial in nature and may reject, in whole or in part, any and all proposals, waive minor irregularities, and conduct discussions with all responsible bidders.

Proposals receiving at least 60 percent (60%) of the points available for the Technical Proposal (a total of 42 out of 70 points) will move on to the next step of the process, the scoring of the cost proposal. Proposals with a score of less than 42 points in the Technical Proposal section will be eliminated from further consideration.

3.2 Technical Criteria/Proposal 70 Points

The Technical Proposal should be organized with tabs clearly labeling each section as detailed below and must include the following:

1. Technical Proposal Section I: Project Description Narrative (8 points)

The project description narrative and supporting materials will be reviewed to determine the overall consistency of the proposal to the stated purpose and outcomes of this RFP. The bidder's ability to complete the required end products and design and facilitate the relevant meetings within the given performance metrics timeline will be taken into consideration. NYSED is expecting that the project description narrative should be no more than approximately 30 pages double-spaced (12 point font).

The project description narrative should include a work plan. The work plan must be clear, detailed, rational, concise and comprehensive. In the work plan, the applicant must ensure the production of applicable products specified in Section 1 of this RFP, broken out into quality work time periods. The workplan must include a detailed timeline indicating an understanding of the deliverables and the timeframes for their delivery. Because the Common Core represents a new national approach to conceptualizing education for all students, including ELLs, this work will require innovation from the applicant.

2. Technical Proposal Section II: Organizational Capacity (42 points)

- a. Describe the organization and its capacity to support this kind of innovative work (4 points). This description should provide a clear understanding of how the applicant will work with NYSED and our vendors to ensure that innovative and high quality research based scaffolds for ELLs are included in our P-12 ELA & Literacy and Math Curriculum.
- b. Staffing Plan (7 points). Provide a staff resource plan, including the names, resumes and qualifications of key staff required to ensure the successful execution of the requirements of this RFP. The proposal must detail the years of experience of key staff in developing research-based scaffolds and/or curricular materials for ELLs. Note: Key staff members cannot be replaced without approval of NYSED, upon justification for the change, and must be replaced by staff with comparable experience and expertise, and at a cost equal to or less than the key staff persons identified in the applicant's proposal.
- c. Expertise in Creating Scaffolds and/or Curricular materials for ELLs (10 points). The proposal must include information demonstrating the applicant's experience in developing scaffolds and/or curricular materials in ELA and/or Math for ELLs. The proposal must also include evidence of effective scaffolding and instructional techniques for ELLs, based on current research-based studies. Research-based studies must be cited with a description of their statistically significant impact on teacher practices and ELL student outcomes. Current research-based studies shall mean conducted in the last five (5) years.
- d. Expertise with the Common Core (10 points). The proposal must include information demonstrating the applicant's understanding and experience with the Common Core. The proposal must include a description of at least three applicant lead projects related to Common Core scaffolds and instruction for ELLs; at least one of which must be with a state education agency or school district.
- e. Expertise with ELL Scaffolding Trainings (8 points). The proposal must include information demonstrating the applicant's experience with providing trainings to curriculum developers, administrators and teachers regarding ELL scaffolding techniques. The proposal must include a current example of such training, including materials presented. Current shall mean trainings conducted within the last two (2) years.
- f. Previous Related Work (3 points). The applicant must provide a list of previous clients including the scope of work completed. In addition to the details of service provided, entities and student populations affected, and duration of contract, contact information for at least three current client references should be detailed. NYSED staff may not be used as references. Each reference should include the name, title, organization, address, telephone number, and email address. The dates of service and a brief summary of the services provided should be included for each reference. The vendor should ensure that contact information is current and accurate.

3. Technical Proposal Section III: Demonstrated Effectiveness (20 points)

The third section of the technical proposal, "Demonstrated Effectiveness", elicits a series of work products that NYSED will use to assess the vendor's effectiveness in the areas of ELL scaffold development specific to Common Core instruction and materials. The work products required for this proposal section are as follows:

a. An analysis of the Grade 6 ELA Common Core exemplar "Common Core Exemplar for Middle School ELA: Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass," available here: http://engageny.org/resource/common-core-exemplar-for-middle-school-ela-narrative-of-the-life-of-frederick-douglass. The analysis must identify areas where additional scaffolds and supports are needed for ELLs of all proficiency levels, the types of scaffolds that would

- support ELLs in accessing this exemplar, and a description of how the applicant would go about developing these additional scaffolds and supports. (7 points)
- Examples of ELL scaffolds created to support Common Core instruction. The examples
 must be aligned to the Common Core ELA or Math standards and provide supports for
 ELLs at all proficiency levels. The examples must also be accompanied by supportive
 training materials. (7 points)
- c. A one or two page description of types of scaffolds that support ELLs, including researchbased citations, and an explanation for how the scaffolds described are aligned to the Common Core. (6 points)

3.3 Financial Criteria

30 Points

The **financial portion** of the proposal represents 30 points of the overall score and will be awarded pursuant to a formula. This calculation will be computed by the Contract Administration Unit upon completion of the technical scoring by the evaluation committee.

The submitted cost information will be awarded points, pursuant to a formula which awards the highest score of 30 points to the proposal that reflects the lowest overall cost. The remaining proposals will be awarded points based on a calculation that computes the relative difference of each proposal against the lowest cost submitted. The resulting percentage is then applied to the maximum point value of 30 points.

NYSED reserves the right to request best and final offers. In the event NYSED exercises this right, all bidders that meet the minimum technical score will be asked to provide a best and final offer. The Contract Administration Unit will recalculate the financial score.

3.4 Method of Award

The aggregate score of all the criteria listed will be calculated for each proposal received. The contract issued pursuant to this proposal will be awarded to the proposal whose aggregate technical and cost score is the highest among all the proposals rated. If NYSED exercises the right to request best and final offers, the contract must be issued to the vendor with the highest aggregate technical and financial score that results from the best and final offer. In the case of a tie score, the bidder among the tied group with the lowest cost will be ranked higher.

3.5 NYSED's Reservation of Rights

NYSED reserves the right to: (1) reject any or all proposals received in response to the RFP; (2) withdraw the RFP at any time, at the agency's sole discretion; (3) make an award under the RFP, in whole or in part; (4) disqualify any bidder whose conduct and/or proposal fails to conform to the requirements of the RFP; (5) seek clarifications of proposals; (6) use proposal information obtained through site visits, management interviews and the State's investigation of a bidder's qualifications, experience, ability, or financial standing, and any material or information submitted by the bidder in response to the agency's request for clarifying information in the course of evaluation and/or selection under the RFP; (7) prior to the bid opening, amend the RFP specifications to correct errors or oversights, or to supply additional information as it becomes available; (8) prior to the bid opening, direct bidders to submit proposal modifications addressing subsequent RFP amendments; (9) change any of the scheduled dates; (10) waive any requirements that are not material; (11) negotiate with the successful bidder within the scope of the RFP in the best interests of the State; (12) conduct contract negotiations with the next responsible bidder, should the agency be unsuccessful in negotiating with

the selected bidder; (13) utilize any and all ideas submitted in the proposals received; (14) unless otherwise specified in the solicitation, every offer is firm and not revocable for a period of 90 days from the bid opening; (15) require clarification at any time during the procurement process and/or require correction of arithmetic or other apparent errors for the purpose of assuring a full and complete understanding of an bidder's proposal and/or to determine a bidder's compliance with the requirements of the solicitation; (16) to request best and final offers.

3.6 Post Selection Procedures

Upon selection, the successful bidder will receive a proposed contract from NYSED. All terms set forth in the selected bidder's technical proposal will be final. The selected bidder may be given an opportunity to reduce its cost proposal in accordance with the agency's right to negotiate a final best price. The contents of this RFP, any subsequent correspondence during the proposal evaluation period, and such other stipulations as agreed upon may be made a part of the final contract prepared by NYSED. Successful bidders may be subject to audit and should ensure that adequate controls are in place to document the allowable activities and expenditure of State funds.

3.7 Debriefing Procedures

All unsuccessful applicants may request a debriefing within five (5) business days of receiving a notice of non-award from NYSED. Applicants may request a debriefing letter on the selection process regarding this RFP by submitting a written request to the Fiscal Contact person at:

The Fiscal Contact person will make arrangements with program staff to provide a written summary of the proposal's strengths and weaknesses, as well as recommendations for improvement. Within ten (10) business days of receipt of the request, the program staff will issue a written debriefing letter to the applicant.

3.8 Contract Award Protest Procedures

Applicants who receive a notice of non-award may protest the NYSED award decision subject to the following:

- 1. The protest must be in writing and must contain specific factual and/or legal allegations setting forth the basis on which the protesting party challenges the contract award by NYSED.
- 2. The protest must be filed within ten (10) business days of receipt of a debriefing letter, or ten (10) business days of receipt of the notice of non-award, whichever is later. The protest letter must be filed with:

3. The NYSED Contract Administration Unit (CAU) will convene a review team that will include at least one staff member from each of NYSED's Office of Counsel, CAU, and the Program Office. The review team will review and consider the merits of the protest and will decide whether the protest is approved or denied. Counsel's Office will provide the bidder with written

notification of the review team's decision within seven (7) business days of receipt of the protest. The original protest and decision will be filed with the OSC when the contract procurement record is submitted for approval and the CAU will advise the OSC that a protest was filed.

4. The NYSED Contract Administration Unit (CAU) may summarily deny a protest that fails to contain specific factual or legal allegations, or where the protest only raises issues of law that have already been decided by the courts.

3.9 Vendor Responsibility

State law requires that the award of state contracts be made to responsible vendors. Before an award is made to a not-for-profit entity, a for-profit entity, a private college or university or a public entity not exempted by the Office of the State Comptroller, NYSED must make an affirmative responsibility determination. The factors to be considered include: legal authority to do business in New York State; integrity; capacity- both organizational and financial; and previous performance. Before an award of \$100,000 or greater can be made to a covered entity, the entity will be required to complete and submit a Vendor Responsibility Questionnaire. School districts, Charter Schools, BOCES, public colleges and universities, public libraries, and the Research Foundation for SUNY and CUNY are some of the exempt entities. For a complete list, see:

Subcontractors:

For vendors using subcontractors, a Vendor Responsibility Questionnaire and a NYSED vendor responsibility review are required for a subcontractor where:

- the subcontractor is known at the time of the contract award:
- the subcontractor is not an entity that is exempt from reporting by OSC; and
- the subcontract will equal or exceed \$100,000 over the life of the contract

Note: Bidders must acknowledge their method of filing their questionnaire by checking the appropriate box on the Response Sheet for Bids (5. Submission Documents).

3.10 PROCUREMENT LOBBYING LAW

Pursuant to State Finance Law §§139-j and 139-k, this solicitation includes and imposes certain restrictions on communications between the New York State Education Department ("NYSED") and an Offerer/bidder during the procurement process. An Offerer/bidder is restricted from making contacts from the earliest notice of the solicitation through final award and approval of the Procurement Contract by NYSED and, if applicable, Office of the State Comptroller ("restricted period") to other than designated staff unless it is a contact that is included among certain statutory exceptions set forth in State Finance Law §139-j(3)(a). Designated staff, as of the date hereof, is identified below. NYSED employees are also required to obtain certain information when contacted during the restricted period and make a determination of the responsibility of the Offerer/bidder pursuant to these two statutes. Certain findings of non-responsibility can result in rejection for contract award and in the event of two findings within a four year period, the Offerer/bidder is debarred from obtaining governmental Procurement Contracts. 3.11 Consultant Disclosure Legislation

Effective June 19, 2006, new reporting requirements became effective for State contractors, as the result of an amendment to State Finance Law §§ 8 and 163. As a result of these changes in law, State contractors will be required to disclose, by employment category, the number of persons employed to provide services under a contract for consulting services, the number of hours worked and the amount paid to the contractor by the State as compensation for work performed by these employees. This will include information on any persons working under any subcontracts with the State contractor.

Chapter 10 of the Laws of 2006 expands the definition of contracts for consulting services to include any contract entered into by a State agency for analysis, evaluation, research, training, data processing, computer programming, engineering, environmental, health, and mental health services, accounting, auditing, paralegal, legal, or similar services.

To enable compliance with the law, State agencies must include in the Procurement Record submitted to OSC for new consultant contracts, the State Consultant Services Contractor's Planned Employment From Contract Start Date Through the End of the Contract Term (Form A - see link below). The completed form must include information for all employees providing service under the contract whether employed by the contractor or a subcontractor. Please note that the form captures the necessary planned employment information *prospectively from the start date of the contract through the end of the contract term*.

Chapter 10 of the Laws of 2006 mandates that State agencies must now require State contractors to **report annually** on the employment information described above, including work performed by subcontractors. The legislation mandates that the annual employment reports are to be submitted by

the contractor to the contracting agency, to OSC and to the Department of Civil Service. State Consultant Services Contractor's Annual Employment Report (<u>Form B</u> - see link below) is to be used to report the information for all procurement contracts above \$15,000. Please note that, in contrast to the information to be included on Form A, which is a one-time report of planned employment data for the entire term of a consulting contract on a projected basis, *Form B will be submitted each year the contract is in effect and will capture historical information, detailing actual employment data for the most recently concluded State fiscal year (April 1 – March 31)*.

3.12 Public Officer's Law Section 73

All bidders must comply with Public Officer's Law Section 73 (4)(a), as follows:

- 4. (a) No statewide elected official, state officer or employee, member of the legislature, legislative employee or political party chairman or firm or association of which such person is a member, or corporation, ten per centum or more of the stock of which is owned or controlled directly or indirectly by such person, shall (i) sell any goods or services having a value in excess of twenty-five dollars to any state agency, or (ii) contract for or provide such goods or services with or to any private entity where the power to contract, appoint or retain on behalf of such private entity is exercised, directly or indirectly, by a state agency or officer thereof, unless such goods or services are provided pursuant to an award or contract let after public notice and competitive bidding. This paragraph shall not apply to the publication of resolutions, advertisements or other legal propositions or notices in newspapers designated pursuant to law for such purpose and for which the rates are fixed pursuant to law.
- (i) The term "state officer or employee" shall mean:
- (i) heads of state departments and their deputies and assistants other than members of the board of regents of the university of the state of New York who receive no compensation or are compensated on a per diem basis;
 - (ii) officers and employees of statewide elected officials;
- (iii) officers and employees of state departments, boards, bureaus, divisions, commissions, councils or other state agencies other than officers of such boards, commissions or councils who receive no compensation or are compensated on a per diem basis; and
- (iv) members or directors of public authorities, other than multistate authorities, public benefit corporations and commissions at least one of whose members is appointed by the governor, who receive compensation other than on a per diem basis, and employees of such authorities, corporations and commissions.

STATE OF NEW YORK AGREEMENT

This AGREEMENT is hereby made by and between the People of the State of New York, acting through John B. King, Jr., Commissioner of Education of the State of New York and Chief Executive Officer of the Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York, party of the first part, hereinafter referred to as the (STATE) and the public or private agency (CONTRACTOR) identified on the face page hereof.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the STATE has the authority to regulate and provide funding for the establishment and operation of program services and desires to contract with skilled parties possessing the necessary resources to provide such services; and

WHEREAS, the CONTRACTOR is ready, willing and able to provide such program services and possesses or can make available all necessary qualified personnel, licenses, facilities and expertise to perform or have performed the services required pursuant to the terms of this AGREEMENT;

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the promises, responsibilities and covenants herein, the STATE and the CONTRACTOR agree as follows:

I. Conditions of Agreement

- A. This AGREEMENT may consist of successive periods (PERIOD), as specified within the AGREEMENT or within a subsequent Modification Agreement(s) (Appendix X). Each additional or superseding PERIOD shall be on the forms specified by the particular State agency, and shall be incorporated into this AGREEMENT.
- B. Funding for the first PERIOD shall not exceed the funding amount specified on the face page hereof. Funding for each subsequent PERIOD, if any, shall not exceed the amount specified in the appropriate appendix for that PERIOD.
- C. This AGREEMENT incorporates the face pages attached and all of the marked appendices identified on the face page hereof.
- D. For each succeeding PERIOD of this AGREEMENT, the parties shall prepare new appendices, to the extent that any require modification, and a Modification Agreement (The attached Appendix X is the blank form to be used). Any terms of this AGREEMENT not modified shall remain in effect for each PERIOD of the AGREEMENT.

To modify the AGREEMENT within an existing PERIOD, the parties shall revise or complete the appropriate appendix form(s). Any change in the amount of consideration to be paid, or change in the term, is subject to the approval of the Office of the State Comptroller. Any other modifications shall be processed in accordance with agency guidelines as stated in Appendix A1.

- E. The CONTRACTOR shall perform all services to the satisfaction of the STATE. The CONTRACTOR shall provide services and meet the program objectives summarized in the Program Workplan (Appendix D) in accordance with: provisions of the AGREEMENT; relevant laws, rules and regulations, administrative and fiscal guidelines; and where applicable, operating certificates for facilities or licenses for an activity or program.
- F. If the CONTRACTOR enters into subcontracts for the performance of work pursuant to this AGREEMENT, the CONTRACTOR shall take full responsibility for the acts and omissions of its subcontractors. Nothing in the subcontract shall impair the rights of the STATE under this AGREEMENT. No contractual relationship shall be deemed to exist between the subcontractor and the STATE.
- G. Appendix A (Standard Clauses as required by the Attorney General for all State contracts) takes precedence over all other parts of the AGREEMENT.

II. Payment and Reporting

A. The CONTRACTOR, to be eligible for payment, shall submit to the STATE's designated payment office (identified in Appendix C) any appropriate documentation as required by the Payment and Reporting Schedule (Appendix C) and by agency fiscal guidelines, in a manner acceptable to the STATE.

- B. The STATE shall make payments and any reconciliations in accordance with the Payment and Reporting Schedule (Appendix C). The STATE shall pay the CONTRACTOR, in consideration of contract services for a given PERIOD, a sum not to exceed the amount noted on the face page hereof or in the respective Appendix designating the payment amount for that given PERIOD. This sum shall not duplicate reimbursement from other sources for CONTRACTOR costs and services provided pursuant to this AGREEMENT.
 - C. The CONTRACTOR shall meet the audit requirements specified by the STATE.

III. <u>Terminations</u>

- A. This AGREEMENT may be terminated at any time upon mutual written consent of the STATE and the CONTRACTOR.
- B. The STATE may terminate the AGREEMENT immediately, upon written notice of termination to the CONTRACTOR, if the CONTRACTOR fails to comply with the terms and conditions of this AGREEMENT and/or with any laws, rules, regulations, policies or procedures affecting this AGREEMENT.
- C. The STATE may also terminate this AGREEMENT for any reason in accordance with provisions set forth in Appendix A1.
- D. Written notice of termination, where required, shall be sent by personal messenger service or by certified mail, return receipt requested. The termination shall be effective in accordance with the terms of the notice.
- E. Upon receipt of notice of termination, the CONTRACTOR agrees to cancel, prior to the effective date of any prospective termination, as many outstanding obligations as possible, and agrees not to incur any new obligations after receipt of the notice without approval by the STATE.
- F. The STATE shall be responsible for payment on claims pursuant to services provided and costs incurred pursuant to terms of the AGREEMENT. In no event shall the STATE be liable for expenses and obligations arising from the program(s) in this AGREEMENT after the termination date.

IV. Indemnification

- A. The CONTRACTOR shall be solely responsible and answerable in damages for any and all accidents and/or injuries to persons (including death) or property arising out of or related to the services to be rendered by the CONTRACTOR or its subcontractors pursuant to this AGREEMENT. The CONTRACTOR shall indemnify and hold harmless the STATE and its officers and employees from claims, suits, actions, damages and costs of every nature arising out of the provision of services pursuant to this AGREEMENT.
- B. The CONTRACTOR is an independent contractor and may neither hold itself out nor claim to be an officer, employee or subdivision of the STATE nor make any claim, demand or application to or for any right based upon any different status.

V. Property

Any equipment, furniture, supplies or other property purchased pursuant to this AGREEMENT is deemed to be the property of the STATE except as may otherwise be governed by Federal or State laws, rules or regulations, or as stated in Appendix AI.

VI. Safeguards for Services and Confidentiality

- A. Services performed pursuant to this AGREEMENT are secular in nature and shall be performed in a manner that does not discriminate on the basis of religious belief, or promote or discourage adherence to religion in general or particular religious beliefs.
- B. Funds provided pursuant to this AGREEMENT shall not be used for any partisan political activity, or for activities that may influence legislation or the election or defeat of any candidate for public office.

C. Information relating to individuals who may receive services pursuant to this AGREEMENT shall be maintained and used only for the purposes intended under the contract and in conformity with applicable provisions of laws and regulations, or specified in Appendix A1.

4.1 APPENDIX A

STANDARD CLAUSES FOR NYS CONTRACTS

The parties to the attached contract, license, lease, amendment or other agreement of any kind (hereinafter, "the contract" or "this contract") agree to be bound by the following clauses which are hereby made a part of the contract (the word "Contractor" herein refers to any party other than the State, whether a contractor, licenser, licensee, lessor, lessee or any other party):

- 1. **EXECUTORY CLAUSE.** In accordance with Section 41 of the State Finance Law, the State shall have no liability under this contract to the Contractor or to anyone else beyond funds appropriated and available for this contract.
- 2. NON-ASSIGNMENT CLAUSE.In accordance with Section 138 of the State Finance Law, this contract may not be assigned by the Contractor or its right, title or interest therein assigned, transferred, conveyed, sublet or otherwise disposed of without the State's previous written consent, and attempts to do so are null and void. Notwithstanding the foregoing, such prior written consent of an assignment of a contract let pursuant to Article XI of the State Finance Law may be waived at the discretion of the contracting agency and with the concurrence of the State Comptroller where the original contract was subject to the State Comptroller's approval, where the assignment is due to a reorganization, merger or consolidation of the Contractor's business entity or enterprise. The State retains its right to approve an assignment and to require that any Contractor demonstrate its responsibility to do business with the State. The Contractor may, however, assign its right to receive payments without the State's prior written consent unless this contract concerns Certificates of Participation pursuant to Article 5-A of the State Finance Law.
- 3. COMPTROLLER'S APPROVAL. In accordance with Section 112 of the State Finance Law (or, if this contract is with the State University or City University of New York, Section 355 or Section 6218 of the Education Law), if this contract exceeds \$50,000 (or the minimum thresholds agreed to by the Office of the State Comptroller for certain S.U.N.Y. and C.U.N.Y. contracts), or if this is an amendment for any amount to a contract which, as so amended, exceeds said statutory amount, or if, by this contract, the State agrees to give something other than money when the value or reasonably estimated value of such consideration exceeds \$10,000, it shall not be valid. effective or binding upon the State until it has been approved by the State Comptroller and filed in his office. Comptroller's approval of contracts let by the Office of General Services is required when such contracts exceed \$85,000 (State Finance Law Section 163.6.a).
- 4. <u>WORKERS' COMPENSATION BENEFITS</u>. In accordance with Section 142 of the State Finance Law, this contract shall be void and of no force and effect unless the Contractor shall provide and maintain coverage during the

life of this contract for the benefit of such employees as are required to be covered by the provisions of the Workers' Compensation Law.

- 5. NON-DISCRIMINATION REQUIREMENTS. extent required by Article 15 of the Executive Law (also known as the Human Rights Law) and all other State and Federal statutory and constitutional non-discrimination provisions, the Contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, creed, color, sex, national origin, sexual orientation, age, disability, genetic predisposition or carrier status, or marital status. Furthermore, in accordance with Section 220-e of the Labor Law, if this is a contract for the construction, alteration or repair of any public building or public work or for the manufacture, sale or distribution of materials, equipment or supplies, and to the extent that this contract shall be performed within the State of New York, Contractor agrees that neither it nor its subcontractors shall, by reason of race, creed, color, disability, sex, or national origin: (a) discriminate in hiring against any New York State citizen who is qualified and available to perform the work; or (b) discriminate against or intimidate any employee hired for the performance of work under this contract. If this is a building service contract as defined in Section 230 of the Labor Law, then, in accordance with Section 239 thereof, Contractor agrees that neither it nor its subcontractors shall by reason of race, creed, color, national origin, age, sex or disability: (a) discriminate in hiring against any New York State citizen who is qualified and available to perform the work; or (b) discriminate against or intimidate any employee hired for the performance of work under this contract. Contractor is subject to fines of \$50.00 per person per day for any violation of Section 220-e or Section 239 as well as possible termination of this contract and forfeiture of all moneys due hereunder for a second or subsequent violation.
- 6. WAGE AND HOURS PROVISIONS. If this is a public work contract covered by Article 8 of the Labor Law or a building service contract covered by Article 9 thereof, neither Contractor's employees nor the employees of its subcontractors may be required or permitted to work more than the number of hours or days stated in said statutes, except as otherwise provided in the Labor Law and as set forth in prevailing wage and supplement schedules issued by the State Labor Department. Furthermore, Contractor and its subcontractors must pay at least the prevailing wage rate and pay or provide the prevailing supplements, including the premium rates for overtime pay, as determined by the State Labor Department in accordance with the Labor Law. Additionally, effective April 28, 2008, if this is a public work contract covered by Article 8 of the Labor Law, the Contractor understands and agrees that the filing of payrolls in a manner consistent with Subdivision 3a of Section 220 of the Labor Law shall be a condition precedent to payment by the State of any State approved sums due and owing for work done upon the project.
- 7. NON-COLLUSIVE BIDDING CERTIFICATION. In accordance with Section 139-d of the State Finance Law, if

this contract was awarded based upon the submission of bids, Contractor affirms, under penalty of perjury, that its bid was arrived at independently and without collusion aimed at restricting competition. Contractor further affirms that, at the time Contractor submitted its bid, an authorized and responsible person executed and delivered to the State a non-collusive bidding certification on Contractor's behalf.

- 8. INTERNATIONAL BOYCOTT PROHIBITION. accordance with Section 220-f of the Labor Law and Section 139-h of the State Finance Law, if this contract exceeds \$5,000, the Contractor agrees, as a material condition of the contract, that neither the Contractor nor any substantially owned or affiliated person, firm, partnership or corporation has participated, is participating, or shall participate in an international boycott in violation of the federal Export Administration Act of 1979 (50 USC App. Sections 2401 et seq.) or regulations thereunder. If such Contractor, or any of the aforesaid affiliates of Contractor, is convicted or is otherwise found to have violated said laws or regulations upon the final determination of the United States Commerce Department or any other appropriate agency of the United States subsequent to the contract's execution, such contract, amendment or modification thereto shall be rendered forfeit and void. The Contractor shall so notify the State Comptroller within five (5) business days of such conviction, determination or disposition of appeal (2NYCRR 105.4).
- 9. SET-OFF RIGHTS. The State shall have all of its common law, equitable and statutory rights of set-off. These rights shall include, but not be limited to, the State's option to withhold for the purposes of set-off any moneys due to the Contractor under this contract up to any amounts due and owing to the State with regard to this contract, any other contract with any State department or agency, including any contract for a term commencing prior to the term of this contract, plus any amounts due and owing to the State for any other reason including, without limitation, tax delinquencies, fee delinquencies or monetary penalties relative thereto. The State shall exercise its setoff rights in accordance with normal State practices including, in cases of set-off pursuant to an audit, the finalization of such audit by the State agency, its representatives, or the State Comptroller.
- 10. RECORDS. The Contractor shall establish and maintain complete and accurate books, records, documents, accounts and other evidence directly pertinent to performance under this contract (hereinafter, collectively, "the Records"). The Records must be kept for the balance of the calendar year in which they were made and for six (6) additional years thereafter. The State Comptroller, the Attorney General and any other person or entity authorized to conduct an examination, as well as the agency or agencies involved in this contract, shall have access to the Records during normal business hours at an office of the Contractor within the State of New York or, if no such office is available, at a mutually agreeable and reasonable venue within the State, for the term specified

above for the purposes of inspection, auditing and copying. The State shall take reasonable steps to protect from public disclosure any of the Records which are exempt from disclosure under Section 87 of the Public Officers Law (the "Statute") provided that: (i) the Contractor shall timely inform an appropriate State official, in writing, that said records should not be disclosed; and (ii) said records shall be sufficiently identified; and (iii) designation of said records as exempt under the Statute is reasonable. Nothing contained herein shall diminish, or in any way adversely affect, the State's right to discovery in any pending or future litigation.

- **IDENTIFYING INFORMATION** AND PRIVACY NOTIFICATION. (a) Identification Number(s). Every invoice or New York State Claim for Payment submitted to a New York State agency by a payee, for payment for the sale of goods or services or for transactions (e.g., leases, easements, licenses, etc.) related to real or personal property must include the payee's identification number. The number is any or all of the following: (i) the payee's Federal employer identification number, (ii) the payee's Federal social security number, and/or (iii) the payee's Vendor Identification Number assigned by the Statewide Financial System. Failure to include such number or numbers may delay payment. Where the payee does not have such number or numbers, the payee, on its invoice or Claim for Payment, must give the reason or reasons why the payee does not have such number or numbers.
- (b) Privacy Notification. (1) The authority to request the above personal information from a seller of goods or services or a lessor of real or personal property, and the authority to maintain such information, is found in Section 5 of the State Tax Law. Disclosure of this information by the seller or lessor to the State is mandatory. The principal purpose for which the information is collected is to enable the State to identify individuals, businesses and others who have been delinquent in filing tax returns or may have understated their tax liabilities and to generally affected identify persons bγ the administered by the Commissioner of Taxation and Finance. The information will be used for tax administration purposes and for any other purpose authorized by law. (2) The personal information is requested by the purchasing unit of the agency contracting to purchase the goods or services or lease the real or personal property

covered by this contract or lease. The information is maintained in the Statewide Financial System by the Vendor Management Unit within the Bureau of State Expenditures, Office of the State Comptroller, 110 State Street, Albany, New York 12236.

- 12. EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES FOR MINORITIES AND WOMEN. In accordance with Section 312 of the Executive Law and 5 NYCRR 143, if this contract is: (i) a written agreement or purchase order instrument, providing for a total expenditure in excess of \$25,000.00, whereby a contracting agency is committed to expend or does expend funds in return for labor, services, supplies, equipment, materials or any combination of the foregoing, to be performed for, or rendered or furnished to the contracting agency; or (ii) a written agreement in excess of \$100,000.00 whereby a contracting agency is committed to expend or does expend funds for the acquisition, construction, demolition, replacement, major repair or renovation of real property and improvements thereon; or (iii) a written agreement in excess of \$100,000.00 whereby the owner of a State assisted housing project is committed to expend or does expend funds for the acquisition, construction, demolition, replacement, major repair or renovation of real property and improvements thereon for such project, then the following shall apply and by signing this agreement the Contractor certifies and affirms that it is Contractor's equal employment opportunity policy that:
- (a) The Contractor will not discriminate against employees or applicants for employment because of race, creed, color, national origin, sex, age, disability or marital status, shall make and document its conscientious and active efforts to employ and utilize minority group members and women in its work force on State contracts and will undertake or continue existing programs of affirmative action to ensure that minority group members and women are afforded equal employment opportunities without discrimination. Affirmative action shall mean recruitment, employment, job assignment, promotion, upgradings, demotion, transfer, layoff, or termination and rates of pay or other forms of compensation;
- (b) at the request of the contracting agency, the Contractor shall request each employment agency, labor union, or authorized representative of workers with which it has a collective bargaining or other agreement or understanding, to furnish a written statement that such employment agency, labor union or representative will not discriminate on the basis of race, creed, color, national origin, sex, age, disability or marital status and that such union or representative will affirmatively cooperate in the implementation of the Contractor's obligations herein; and
- (c) the Contractor shall state, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees, that, in the performance of the State contract, all qualified applicants will be afforded equal employment opportunities without discrimination

because of race, creed, color, national origin, sex, age, disability or marital status.

Contractor will include the provisions of "a", "b", and "c" above, in every subcontract over \$25,000.00 for the construction, demolition, replacement, major repair, renovation, planning or design of real property and improvements thereon (the "Work") except where the Work is for the beneficial use of the Contractor. Section 312 does not apply to: (i) work, goods or services unrelated to this contract; or (ii) employment outside New York State. The State shall consider compliance by a contractor or subcontractor with the requirements of any federal law concerning equal employment opportunity effectuates the purpose of this section. The contracting agency shall determine whether the imposition of the requirements of the provisions hereof duplicate or conflict with any such federal law and if such duplication or conflict exists, the contracting agency shall waive the applicability of Section 312 to the extent of such duplication or conflict. Contractor will comply with all duly promulgated and lawful rules and regulations of the Department of Economic Development's Division of Minority and Women's Business Development pertaining hereto.

- **13. CONFLICTING TERMS.** In the event of a conflict between the terms of the contract (including any and all attachments thereto and amendments thereof) and the terms of this Appendix A, the terms of this Appendix A shall control.
- **14. GOVERNING LAW.** This contract shall be governed by the laws of the State of New York except where the Federal supremacy clause requires otherwise.
- **15. LATE PAYMENT**. Timeliness of payment and any interest to be paid to Contractor for late payment shall be governed by Article 11-A of the State Finance Law to the extent required by law.
- **16. NO ARBITRATION.** Disputes involving this contract, including the breach or alleged breach thereof, may not be submitted to binding arbitration (except where statutorily authorized), but must, instead, be heard in a court of competent jurisdiction of the State of New York.
- 17. SERVICE OF PROCESS. In addition to the methods of service allowed by the State Civil Practice Law & Rules ("CPLR"), Contractor hereby consents to service of process upon it by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested. Service hereunder shall be complete upon Contractor's actual receipt of process or upon the State's receipt of the return thereof by the United States Postal Service as refused or undeliverable. Contractor must promptly notify the State, in writing, of each and every change of address to which service of process can be made. Service by the State to the last known address shall be sufficient. Contractor will have thirty (30) calendar days after service hereunder is complete in which to respond.

18. PROHIBITION ON PURCHASE OF TROPICAL HARDWOODS. The Contractor certifies and warrants that all wood products to be used under this contract award will be in accordance with, but not limited to, the specifications and provisions of Section 165 of the State Finance Law, (Use of Tropical Hardwoods) which prohibits purchase and use of tropical hardwoods, unless specifically exempted, by the State or any governmental agency or political subdivision or public benefit corporation. Qualification for an exemption under this law will be the responsibility of the contractor to establish to meet with the approval of the State.

In addition, when any portion of this contract involving the use of woods, whether supply or installation, is to be performed by any subcontractor, the prime Contractor will indicate and certify in the submitted bid proposal that the subcontractor has been informed and is in compliance with specifications and provisions regarding use of tropical hardwoods as detailed in §165 State Finance Law. Any such use must meet with the approval of the State; otherwise, the bid may not be considered responsive. Under bidder certifications, proof of qualification for exemption will be the responsibility of the Contractor to meet with the approval of the State.

- 19. MACBRIDE FAIR EMPLOYMENT PRINCIPLES. In accordance with the MacBride Fair Employment Principles (Chapter 807 of the Laws of 1992), the Contractor hereby stipulates that the Contractor either (a) has no business operations in Northern Ireland, or (b) shall take lawful steps in good faith to conduct any business operations in Northern Ireland in accordance with the MacBride Fair Employment Principles (as described in Section 165 of the New York State Finance Law), and shall permit independent monitoring of compliance with such principles.
- **20.** OMNIBUS PROCUREMENT ACT OF 1992. It is the policy of New York State to maximize opportunities for the participation of New York State business enterprises, including minority and women-owned business enterprises as bidders, subcontractors and suppliers on its procurement contracts.

Bidders are hereby notified that if their principal place of business is located in a country, nation, province, state or political subdivision that penalizes New York State vendors, and if the goods or services they offer will be substantially produced or performed outside New York State, the Omnibus Procurement Act 1994 and 2000 amendments (Chapter 684 and Chapter 383, respectively) require that they be denied contracts which they would otherwise obtain. NOTE: As of May 15, 2002, the list of discriminatory jurisdictions subject to this provision includes the states of South Carolina, Alaska, West Virginia, Wyoming, Louisiana and Hawaii. Contact NYS Department of Economic Development for a current list of jurisdictions subject to this provision.
- 22. COMPLIANCE WITH NEW YORK STATE INFORMATION SECURITY BREACH AND NOTIFICATION ACT. Contractor shall comply with the provisions of the New York State Information Security Breach and Notification Act (General Business Law Section 899-aa; State Technology Law Section 208).
- **23.** COMPLIANCE WITH CONSULTANT DISCLOSURE LAW. If this is a contract for consulting services, defined for purposes of this requirement to include analysis, evaluation, research, training, data processing, computer

programming, engineering, environmental, health, and mental health services, accounting, auditing, paralegal, legal or similar services, then, in accordance with Section 163 (4-g) of the State Finance Law (as amended by Chapter 10 of the Laws of 2006), the Contractor shall timely, accurately and properly comply with the requirement to submit an annual employment report for the contract to the agency that awarded the contract, the Department of Civil Service and the State Comptroller.

24. PROCUREMENT LOBBYING. To the extent this agreement is a "procurement contract" as defined by State Finance Law Sections 139-j and 139-k, by signing this agreement the contractor certifies and affirms that all disclosures made in accordance with State Finance Law Sections 139-j and 139-k are complete, true and accurate. In the event such certification is found to be intentionally false or intentionally incomplete, the State may terminate the agreement by providing written notification to the Contractor in accordance with the terms of the agreement.

25. CERTIFICATION OF REGISTRATION TO COLLECT SALES AND COMPENSATING USE TAX BY CERTAIN STATE CONTRACTORS, AFFILIATES AND SUBCONTRACTORS.

To the extent this agreement is a contract as defined by Tax Law Section 5-a, if the contractor fails to make the certification required by Tax Law Section 5-a or if during the term of the contract, the Department of Taxation and Finance or the covered agency, as defined by Tax Law 5-a, discovers that the certification, made under penalty of perjury, is false, then such failure to file or false certification shall be a material breach of this contract and this contract may be terminated, by providing written notification to the Contractor in accordance with the terms of the agreement, if the covered agency determines that such action is in the best interest of the State. (December 2011)

4.2 APPENDIX A-1

Payment and Reporting

- A. In the event that Contractor shall receive, from any source whatsoever, sums the payment of which is in consideration for the same costs and services provided to the State, the monetary obligation of the State hereunder shall be reduced by an equivalent amount provided, however, that nothing contained herein shall require such reimbursement where additional similar services are provided and no duplicative payments are received.
- B. Variations in each budget category not exceeding ten percent (10%) of such category may be approved by the Commissioner of Education. Any such variations shall be reflected in the final expenditure report and filed in the Office of the State Comptroller. Variations in each budget category which do exceed ten percent (10%) of such category must be submitted to the Office of the State Comptroller for approval.
- C. For each individual for whom costs are claimed under this agreement, the contractor warrants that the individual has been classified as an employee or as an independent contractor in accordance with 2 NYCRR 315 and all applicable laws including, but not limited to, the Internal Revenue Code, the New York Retirement and Social Security Law, the New York Education Law, the New York Labor Law, and the New York Tax Law. Furthermore, the contractor warrants that all project funds allocated to the proposed budget for Employee Benefits, represent costs for employees of the contractor only and that such funds will not be expended on any individual classified as an independent contractor.

Terminations

- A. The State may terminate this Agreement without cause by thirty (30) days prior written notice. In the event of such termination, the parties will adjust the accounts due and the Contractor will undertake no additional expenditures not already required. Upon any such termination, the parties shall endeavor in an orderly manner to wind down activities hereunder.
- B. SED reserves the right to terminate this Agreement in the event it is found that the certification by the Contractor in accordance with New York State Finance Law §139-k was intentionally false or intentionally incomplete. Upon such finding, SED may exercise its termination right by providing written notification to the Contractor in accordance with the written notification terms of this Agreement.

Property

A. The Contractor shall maintain a complete inventory of all realty, equipment and other non-expendable assets including, but not limited to, books, paintings, artifacts, rare coins, antiques and other collectible items purchased, improved or developed under this agreement. The Contractor shall submit a copy of the inventory in a form identical to or essentially similar to, Exhibit A annexed hereto. The term "non-expendable assets" shall mean for the purposes of this agreement any and all assets which are not consumed during the term of this agreement and which have a cost of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) or more.

Inventories for non-expendable assets must be submitted with the final expenditure report. In addition to or as part of whatever rights the State may have with respect to the inspection of the Contractor, the State shall have the right to inspect the inventory without notice to the Contractor.

The Contractor shall not at any time sell, trade, convey or otherwise dispose of any non-expendable assets having a market value in excess of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) at the time of the desired disposition without the express permission of the State. The Contractor may seek permission in writing by certified mail to the State.

The Contractor shall not at any time use or allow to be used any non-expendable assets in a manner inconsistent with the purposes of this agreement.

- B. If the Contractor wishes to continue to use any of the non-expendable assets purchased with the funds available under this agreement upon the termination of this agreement, it shall request permission from the State in writing for such continued use within twenty-five (25) days of the termination of this agreement. The Contractor's request shall itemize the non-expendable assets for which continued use is sought. The State may accept, reject or accept in part such request. If the request for continued use is allowed to any degree, it shall be conditioned upon the fact that said equipment shall continue to be used in accordance with the purposes of this agreement.
 - If after the State grants permission to the Contractor for "continued use" as set forth above the non-expendable assets are not used in accordance with the purposes of this agreement, the State in its discretion may elect to take title to such assets and may assert its right to possession upon thirty (30) days prior written notice by certified mail to the Contractor. The State upon obtaining such non-expendable assets may arrange for their further use in the public interest as it in its discretion may decide.
- C. Upon termination of this agreement, the State in its discretion may elect to take title and may assert its right to possession of any non-expendable assets upon thirty (30) days prior written notice by certified mail to the Contractor. The State's option to elect to take title shall be triggered by the termination of this agreement or by the State's rejection of continued use of non-expendable assets by the Contractor as set forth herein. The State upon obtaining such non-expendable assets may arrange for their further use in the public interest as it in its discretion may decide.
- D. The terms and conditions set forth herein regarding non-expendable assets shall survive the expiration or termination, for whatever reason, of this agreement.

Safeguards for Services and Confidentiality

- A. Any copyrightable work produced pursuant to said agreement shall be the sole and exclusive property of the New York State Education Department. The material prepared under the terms of this agreement by the Contractor shall be prepared by the Contractor in a form so that it will be ready for copyright in the name of the New York State Education Department. Materials are designed so that the central focus of classroom time is spent on the close, sustained reading of complex texts—often taking several days of concentrated study on a short text or a passage in a longer text—including writing and conversations (speaking and listening) that center on those texts. Such reading emphasizes the particular over the general, encouraging students to read and re-read deliberately and slowly to probe and ponder the meanings of individual words and sentences, the order in which sentences unfold, and the development of ideas over the course of the text. Lastly, a curriculum unit is composed of central texts, student outcomes aligned to the NYS P-12 CCLS for ELA & Literacy (driven by a learning progression), along with a collection of daily lessons.
